At WOMEX 2025 in Tampere. Estonia turns up the volume with a programme that captures the bold, borderless spirit of a country whose music scene punches far above its size. From ancient runo songs and hypnotic electronic beats to dazzling cross-genre collaborations, Estonia's artists show how a small nation can make a big noise on the world stage.

The Estonian presence at WOMEX is coordinated by Music Estonia in partnership with the Estonian Traditional Music Center and Tallinn Music Week, supported by the Ministry of Culture of Estonia, the Embassy of Estonia in Finland, and Studio Sound. Together they present a snapshot of Estonia's vibrant cultural landscape—deeply rooted, fearlessly innovative, and always in motion.

Three showcases tell the story:

KASS-TALSI-MINN, a genre-bending trio where jazz, folk and early music collide in thrilling, unexpected ways.

00PUS, an audiovisual folktronica crew fusing ancient melodies with pulsing beats, immersive visuals and Finno-Ugric mythology.

THE BALTICSISTERS, an international trio weaving Estonian, Latvian and Lithuanian voices into the unique harmony of Baltic polyphony.

Alongside the live performances, Estonia hosts the Meet Estonia Reception, collaborates on a Nordic-Baltic joint area with meet-ups, and presents the conference panel Navigating the Baltic Music Ecosystem, creating opportunities to connect, collaborate and discover the region's creative potential.

Estonia's presence at WOMEX embodies curiosity, courage, and collaboration—a meeting point of tradition and innovation. north and east, intimacy and ambition. From the guiet forests to the global stage, this is the sound of Estonia: distinctive, daring, and ready to be heard.



ARTISTS



What happens when three musicians from entirely different worlds collide? A versatile jazz bassist, a brilliant mandolinist from the folk and bluegrass scene, and an emerging viola talent from Estonia have joined forces to create something unexpected.

The trio's repertoire weaves together original compositions, inventive arrangements of 16th–17th-century English music, and vibrant adaptations of traditional folk melodies. They prove that great music transcends era and genre.

Bassist and composer Peedu Kass is a household name on the Estonian music scene. Renowned for his electric, acoustic, and synth bass prowess—with ensembles ranging from intimate groups to full orchestras—Kass has expanded into arrangement and composition, winning the 'Jazz Composer of the Year' prize at the Estonian Jazz Awards 2022.

Mandolinist Villu Talsi is celebrated for his work with popular folk/bluegrass group Curly Strings. A dynamic improviser with magnetic stage presence, he also holds a bachelor's degree in jazz guitar and lights up every major music festival in Estonia.

Simone Minn is a young viola player whose artistry springs from folk tradition whilst enriched by jazz explorations. Her music blends the viola's lyrical voice with compelling storytelling shaped by diverse cultural influences. Two years ago, she stunned audiences with a distinctive solo album as a guitar-playing singer-songwriter.

KASS-TALSI-MINN

ARTISTS



OOPUS is an Estonian audiovisual folktronica band formed in 2017 by musicians Mari Meentalo and Johannes Ahun. They fuse ancient runo songs with contemporary electronic dance music—from techno and acid to dub and ambient. Blending analogue synthesisers with traditional instruments like Estonian bagpipes and overtone flutes, they reimagine folk heritage as a soundscape of the future. Visual artist Aleksander Sprohgis and dancer Raho Aadla later joined, expanding the project's creative vision through dance and interactive visuals.

Every OOPUS show merges live music, immersive visuals, and Finno-Ugric mythology. Their performances feature custom-built light installations, movement-reactive visuals, and club-inspired energy, placing audiences at the centre of the experience.

Since their debut album *Nōidus* (2019), nominated at the Estonian Music Awards, OOPUS have performed from underground raves to major international festivals including Viljandi Folk Music Festival at home, Burning Man in the USA, ESNS in the Netherlands, and Linecheck in Italy. Their second album *Folk On Acid* (2022) won the Raadio 2 Special Prize at the Estonian Ethno Music Awards. Their third album, *Reivlender*, arrives in 2025.

OOPUS collaborate widely, from projects with conductor Kristjan Järvi to Tartu 2024 European Capital of Culture, whilst producing stages for Tallinn Music Week and I Land Sound festival.

The Baltic Sisters is an international traditional music project born at WOMEX Lisbon in late 2022, where singers from Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania united through their passion for *sutartines*—ancient Lithuanian multipart songs. Their repertoire now encompasses traditional music from all three Baltic nations.

On stage, Latvian, Lithuanian, and Estonian folk songs interweave to create a distinctive Baltic sound. The singers also lead masterclasses in Baltic traditional singing styles.

In January 2025, The Baltic Sisters released their debut album *Värav / Vārti / Vartai* (gateway in Estonian, Latvian, and Lithuanian) on German label CPL-Music. The album features polyphonic folk songs arranged by the group, including a long call from Southern Kurzeme, the lyrical 'Soka saule rītiedama' from Latgale, UNESCO-listed Lithuanian *sutartinės*, Seto songs from Estonia, and compositions blending all three traditions.

'Our first album is a gateway to the world of Baltic traditional music, as we hear, feel, and share it with others. The songs we chose are those through which we met and got to know each other,' they explain.

The Baltic Sisters have performed at Lithuania's largest ethno music festival Mėnuo Juodaragis, Valmiermuiža in Latvia, Viljandi Folk Music Festival and Tallinn Music Week in Estonia, Buskers Festival de Neuchâtel in Switzerland, and Festival Arrée Voce in France.

TMW's music programme is renowned for its bold mix of unique talent spanning diverse genres from pop to contemporary classical and folk, presented to an audience of around 20,000 festivalgoers and 1,300 industry professionals. The TMW conference addresses music-related topics from practical workshops to inspiring pop-culture talks and cross-sectoral future visions.

Run by companies Muusikanädal and Shiftworks, TMW is a co-founder of The Federation of International Music Conferences (FoMC), and a member of the European Talent Exchange, Keychange, and the European showcase platform for global music UPBEAT.

TMW also contributes to the Music Moves Europe (MME) structured dialogue series steered by the European Commission and implemented by a consortium composed of ESNS (NL), TMW (EE), Reeperbahn Festival (DE), Linecheck (IT), EEMC (RO) and MaMA (FR). The next dialogue on music will take place on 23 October in Tampere, exploring how to future-proof the European music ecosystem through new skills, inclusive education, and lifelong learning.



Mari Kalkun possesses a voice that seems to speak to us from the heart of the Estonian forest. Her music is at once rooted in place and deeply personal, an intimacy born of Baltic winter forests and icy landscapes—and yet there is renewal, hope, and celebration to be heard.

Mari Kalkun's music has a timeless quality and an unhurried sense of time and space. Rooted in ancient Estonian and Võru traditions and played on a variety of instruments including vocals, kannel, piano, electronics, and percussive instruments, her music resonates deep within us to touch our spirits and souls, even when the language is strange to us.

With her latest album *Stories of Stonia* (Real World Records, 2023), co-produced with Sam Lee, Mari has taken the album to more than 20 countries around the globe, receiving much international acclaim. It reached number one in the Transglobal World Music Chart and was shortlisted for the Songlines Best New Albums list. Mari's music has been supported by respected media including the Financial Times, BBC, and Lira Music Magazine. Success has continued with the live version of the album (Real World Records, 2025), which also features a collaboration with the Estonian National Male Choir.
